Philomena, directed by **Stephen Frears** (*The Queen, Dangerous Liaisons*), is the true story of one mother's search for her lost son. Falling pregnant as a teenager in Ireland in 1952, Philomena Lee was sent to the convent of Roscrea to be looked after as a "fallen woman". When her baby was only a toddler, he was whisked away by the nuns to America for adoption. Philomena (**Judi Dench**) spent the next fifty years searching for him in vain. Then she met Martin Sixsmith (the hilarious **Steve Coogan**), a world-weary journalist as cynical as Philomena was trusting. Together they set off for America on a journey that would not only reveal the extraordinary story of Philomena's son, but also the powerful bond that grew between Philomena and Martin.

Based on **Sixsmith's** acclaimed book, Frears masterfully delivers a moving and surprisingly funny delight, a compelling narrative of human love and loss and ultimately a celebration of life. With a phenomenal lead performance from Judi Dench, *Philomena* premiered to rapturous applause just weeks ago at the Venice Film Festival.

When a young girl is brutally murdered in a small seaside town, brothers Joe Fairburn (**Paul Bettany**, *A Beautiful Mind*, *Wimbledon*) and Chrissie Fairburn (**Stephen Graham**, *This Is England*, *Snatch*) investigate the case. In no time, a perfect suspect is found: ex-con Buleigh (**Ben Crompton**. *Kill List*. *All or Nothing*).

Frustrated by the speed of bureaucracy and spurred on by the rough justice talk of their father and former police chief, Lenny (**Brian Cox**, *Troy*, *Rushmore*), the brothers inflict their own form of vengeance on Buleigh. However, when another suspect emerges, they must confront the brutal vigilantism in their blood.

Based on the acclaimed BBC series *Conviction*, and produced by Academy Award-winner **Sam Mendes** (*American Beauty, Revolutionary Road*), director **Nick Murphy** (*The Awakening*) brings this taught thriller to the big screen with a sensational cast. Bettany and Graham are brilliant as two men tortured by their actions and terrified of discovery, and **Mark Strong** (*Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy, Zero Dark Thirty*) is a standout as a loner with suspicions about his volatile colleagues.

Their bittersweet second honeymoon stirs up fears of loss and forces them to question a future together.

Hanif Kureishi's wonderful script, full of offbeat detail, reflects his talents as a playwright, while Broadbent and Duncan clearly relish their complex and nuanced characters. Jeff Goldblum (Independence Day, Jurassic Park) delivers one of his best performances to date as Morgan, a successful author and Nick's former Cambridge classmate.

Kureishi and director Roger Michell (Notting Hill, Changing Lanes, Morning Glory) have previously collaborated on The Mother and Venus. This, their third film, premiered at the 2013 Toronto International Film Festival to acclaim from critics and audiences alike

Le Week-End is a poignant, sharp and funny film about a love that could either flicker out at any moment or continue to burn. Reminiscent of late 80's Woody Allen, this refreshingly intelligent treatment of mature romance is an absolute joy – and an unmissable festival highlight.

Kate Spicer is a journalist and William Spicer is a filmmaker. Their brother, Tom Spicer, suffers from a severe form of autism known as Fragile X syndrome, and has repeatedly stated "wanna meet Lars.". Acknowledging that they have never really bonded with their brother. Will and Kate make it their mission to take him to America to meet his hero

The siblings fly to Los Angeles and hire a motor home to live in while following Metallica's tour, but Kate and Will soon discover how little they know about their brother's condition. Tom's need for routine and his anxiety in unpredictable social situations are just some of the challenges the siblings face during their exhausting journey. As frustration builds, they question both the reason behind their mission and whether the journey is too painful for Tom to continue.

Not only is this wonderful documentary a completely engaging and genuinely moving experience, but all profits made from the film are going to charity.

A consistent presence on various best films of all time lists, *The Third Man* is not only classic film noir and an illuminating snapshot of post-war Vienna, it is also a brilliantly crafted and thoroughly entertaining thriller.

When American pulp writer Holly Martins (Joseph Cotton) arrives in Allied-occupied Vienna to find his old friend Harry Lime (Orson Welles), he is told that Lime has died in mysterious circumstances. With an army police officer (Trevor Howard) and a femme fatale (Alida Valli), Martins navigates a shadowy world of deception, danger and black marketeering in his search for the truth.

The atmospheric cinematography made the most of seedy Vienna locations at the beginning of the Cold War, with the now iconic sewer chase filmed later at Shepperton Studios in England. A perfect collaboration between three giants (director Carol Reed, screenwriter Graham Greene and star Orson Welles), The Third Man remains a classic film with its ingenious plot, memorable zither soundtrack and cynical dialogue such as the famous 'cuckoo clock' speech.

'It all started on an ordinary day, in the most ordinary place in the world.' Achingly beautiful, the beloved 1945 romantic drama *Brief Encounter* is arguably **David Lean's** finest work – striking at the heart, and at the soul.

Two strangers meet in a railway station café: a doctor (**Trevor Howard**) and a housewife (**Celia Johnson**). Although they are both happily married, they fall in love and continue to meet – even though they know their illicit romance cannot last.

Adapted from a one-act play by **Noel Coward**, this is director David Lean's most intimate and poignant film, and it was the first to land him an Oscar nomination. The two leads give pitch-perfect performances as the buttoned-down couple who find a new awakening after years of dull routine, while the accompanying musical score makes perfect use of **Rachmaninoff's** beautiful Second Piano Concerto.

Never melodramatic or moralising (in fact it was banned in Ireland for treating adultery sympathetically), *Brief Encounter* announced Lean as a poet of cinema and remains a cherished favourite of romantics everywhere.



The only way to fully appreciate Lawrence of Arabia is on the big screen. **David Lean's 1962** film is a true epic, and one of the greatest films of all time.

Based on the life of **T.E. Lawrence**, the film stars **Peter O'Toole** as the title character, chronicling his experiences in Arabia during the First World War. Balancing big canvas set pieces, such as the attacks on Aqaba and Damascus, with Lawrence's own personal struggles between violence, peace and conflicting loyalties, *Lawrence of Arabia* is both a sprawling historical story and an intimate portrait.

Co-starring Alec Guinness, Anthony Quinn, Omar Sharif and Claude Rains, the film is famous not only for its sweeping widescreen desert vistas but for its stirring musical score by Maurice Jarre and its literate screenplay by Robert Bolt and Michael Wilson.

Winner of seven Oscars in 1963, including the Academy Award for Best Picture, Lawrence of Arabia was a huge critical and financial success and it remains adored by viewers and critics alike. Before he went on to international success in Hollywood with the likes of *Vertigo, Psycho* and *The Birds*, director **Alfred Hitchcock** made his name with a series of thrillers in England. Arguably, the best of these was *The 39 Steps* in 1935 – considered his first real masterpiece.

Loosely based **John Buchan's** 1915 novel, the film follows the adventures of Richard Hannay, a man who stands wrongly accused of murder and must go on the run while trying to clear his name and thwart a band of spies in the process. **Robert Donat** plays Hannay with lashings of irresistible charm, while **Madeleine Carroll** is Pamela. his cool, icv and initially reluctant companion.

This is the model Hitchcockian 'wrong man' story. Multiple locations, cross-country trains, love on the run, comedy, romance and dastardly villains would all feature again in *North by Northwest* – widely considered his "American 39 Steps". Balancing high tension, humour and inventive set-pieces, it's clear with *The 39 Steps* that Hitchcock was already a master of suspense, and destined to be one of cinema's greats.




